Henriette Mandl was born in Vienna in 1928, and her detailed walking tours in this volume bespeak considerable affection and enthusiasm for her home city. She covers 6 walking tours in this volume. The 1st is devoted to St. Stephen's Cathedral, the heart of the city, alone. The next 4 are walking tours that start from St. Stephen's Cathedral, and explore many nooks and crannies that are near the "tourist trap" areas in central Vienna, yet also take the willing explorer beyond the obvious sights towards more hidden treasures. The 6th and last tour starts at the Staatsoper, and is perhaps slightly more of a concession to some of the more obvious "popular" sights, but still keeps to the spirit of touching on subtler sights to be found. There is a "bonus chapter" which covers sightseeing the Ringstrasse, but not necessarily on a walking tour, given the sheer length of the Ringstrasse. This book was originally published in 1987, and Mandl notes that some of the details covered in the book will undoubtedly have changed over the years. Even though I myself haven't been to Vienna in over a decade, I'm willing to guess that most of the details of the sights, at least, will still be valid. If you have a good pair of shoes and a willingness to go beyond the Vienna tourist traps, this

book may be for you.(PS: the header has an obvious typo, of "Downtown" instead of "Downtown".)
