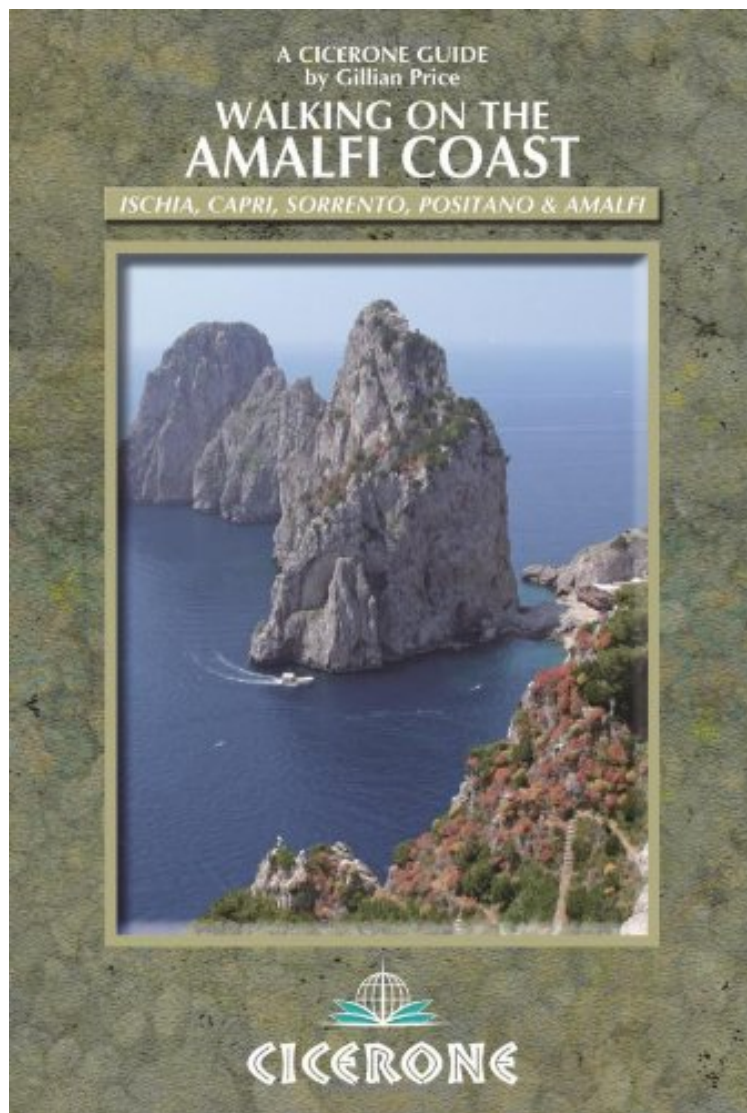

They're detailed, easy to follow, and cost a few Euro.This book rambles, the maps are worthless, and the details about bus routes, plant life, and navigation aren't useful.That said, the walks along the coastline are **SUBLIME**. Highly recommended - and very easy for moderately fit people - is the

famous Path of the Gods ("Sentiero degli Dei") from Bomerano to Positano. We went with a group aged between 10 and 55, and had a wonderful day. Walk out of Nocelle along the road that wends down to Positano, and after about a mile or so you'll come across two restaurants perched on the cliffs with spectacular view and equally spectacular food. Enjoy!

I also wish this book had some good hiking maps of the entire area. I'll need to get a hiking map to compliment this book for planning the trip.

Known as the Amalfi Coast, the steep southern edge of the Sorrento peninsula, on the Gulf of Naples, famous for its medieval villages perched atop plunging cliffs, with their near-vertical vineyards and lemon orchards, is now recognised as a World Heritage Site. This coastline, the rugged landscape behind, crowned by the Monti Lattari, and the idyllic islands of Capri and Ischia together also make a perfect holiday destination for walkers. The whole area is crisscrossed by ancient mule tracks, pilgrim routes and goat tracks, offering a variety of walking from family strolls to strenuous treks across terrain from paved paths to verdant hillside paths and rough volcanic scree. Each of these 30 routes in this guide is designed to be fitted into a single day, with a panoramic picnic stop halfway round and perhaps a plunge into the sparkling Mediterranean at the end.
